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We acknowledge the traditional owners and custodians of country throughout Australia and their continuing connection to land, waters and community. We pay our respects to them and their cultures, and elders past, present and future.



As our industry continues to work through this crisis, it is becoming clear that ecotourism will be in an ideal position to support our communities and wider visitors into the future, providing experiences that deliver on the needs and expectations of re-emerging local, national and international travellers. These travellers will be seeking safe but transformational experiences that mentally and physically help them to 'recharge' and connect with what really matters in life - experiences embedded in sustainability; destinations whose communities are engaged welcoming because their and tourism experiences have been designed with respect to community needs; places where the environment and culture are valued by those who live there experiences which enable meaningful and engagement with and contributions to the destination.

The travellers of the future will want to engage with nature to improve their own personal wellbeing and the wellbeing of others. We have already seen a growing trend in the need for people to reconnect with families and friends as well as nature itself. Tomorrow's travellers will want their travel to make a difference at a personal and wider level.

These are high expectations for the future of travel, but in our eyes, the new world will be a world in which ecotourism will flourish.

The past year has been traumatic for all, but it has also opened our eyes to new opportunities. Ecotourism Australia has partnered with the World Wide Fund for Nature-Australia (WWF-Australia) to deliver bushfire recovery programs; our ECO Destination Certification program has grown from strength to strength, our annual Global Eco Conference is likely to be delivered (mostly) via online streaming and applications for ECO Certification have been higher than in any other year. A year ago, none of this was expected.

Powerful voices like Tourism Australia are talking about sustainability for the first time. South Australia's further implementation of its 'Nature Like Nowhere Else' program is impressive. Queensland is near completion of its Nature Based Tourism campaign and nearly every state and territory is really focusing on its nature-based tourism programs and assets.

The time is right for ecotourism and we look forward to working closely with our operators, destinations and stakeholders to realise this promise and see those communities hard hit in recent times prosper again.

In closing, I would like to pass on my thanks to Rod and our staff and also the whole EA Board for their support and hard work over the past year. I'd also like to make special mention of two retiring Board members, Rick Murray and Peter Cochrane, both of whom have made enormous contributions to EA and will be sadly missed.

Our ECO Certification gives us a moment of pride to know that our efforts in an eco approach to tourism are acknowledged.

The challenges of the past year are well known and continuing. COVID has buried its teeth into us and is reluctant to let go whilst the traumas of bushfires, droughts and floods remain. Through all this, the tenacity and resilience shown by the broader industry and EA members has been nothing short of inspirational and has provided solace and support to their communities and staff. We applaud the Federal Government's support through JobKeeper as this is the main reason why many of us have been able to keep our doors open. The State Governments have also helped through waiving fees and charges and introducing a range of grants and support programs that has been needed and appreciated. Obviously, there is more, much more, that will need to come as the shadow of COVID slowly recedes.

The bushfires started in August last year, building on the extensive droughts plaguing our inland regions. The fires rolled on until February causing devastation to huge areas around Australia, but the impact was national. The imagery transmitted around the globe portrayed the whole country to be on fire, stalling international visitors.

After the fires came the floods, then COVID. We're beginning to ask what could possibly come next?

But through all this EA members continued working for their business, their staff and their communities. Members such as Craig Wickham (Exceptional Kangaroo Island) hitting the talkback circuit in the US, Peter Gash (Lady Elliot Island) telling anyone who would listen 'we're open for business' and Kristie Kearney (Wolgan Valley Eco Tours) staying positive through bushfires and COVID and creating new tours. The EA Board and staff thank you all.

We've been busy too, 'building back better'. Since COVID began we have spent considerable time lobbying on behalf of our members and working in a constructive manner with other organisations to present a coordinated voice to governments for the support of tourism needs. A benefit of this crisis is how the range of tourism organisations have rallied and worked together to provide a consistent and powerful message to those in power with great success.

We've also focused on engaging regions with our ECO Destinations program which will bring an increased support regime from local governments and LTO/RTOs to ecotourism operators. During the COVID crisis, we've engaged a further eight (8) regions, increasing our number to 12 committed with a further six expected to join the program before the end of 2020. This means we now have close to 20% of our members within a region applying for ECO Destination certification with the aim of having 50% by the end of 2021.

Another major initiative has been our partnership with the World Wildlife Fund for Nature-Australia (WWF-Australia) where we are working closely with six bushfire impacted regions in NSW, Victoria, South Australia and Queensland to assist them in their recovery efforts through sustainable and ecotourism programs.

We are rapidly moving towards a 100% online delivery model for our certification programs making gaining and maintaining certification easier.

In closing I want to give my personal thanks to you, our incredible members who provide inspiration and support, my dedicated staff who endlessly give more than they are asked and the Board's leadership and strength – especially in these extraordinary times.

The team at BIG4 Adventure Whitsunday Resort completed our Ecotourism Australia Certification using the new online portal. It was such a streamlined process from start to finish as we could clearly monitor our progress throughout and make use of the tips and templates provided, which proved invaluable. Using the online portal just made the whole process so clean and efficient. Thank you to the Ecotourism Australia team for your support and guidance throughout!

Certified operators can also upgrade to the ECO V standard online.

Ecotourism Australia has templates, factsheets and best practice examples from other operators available in our Resources section to assist applicants and certified operators improving their operations and meeting the certification standard.

ECO DESTINATION PROGRAM

One of the most exciting developments for Ecotourism Australia (EA) over the past 12 months has been the growth in uptake of the ECO Destination Certification Program. At the 2019 Global Eco Asia Pacific Tourism Conference in Cairns, Port Douglas Daintree (QLD) was awarded the title of world's First ECO Certified Destination following months of hard work on their application and the passing of their first onsite audit.

Since then, many other destinations have followed in their footsteps, solidifying their commitment to building a business environment in which ecotourism thrives; ensuring internal and external destination management practices are in line with practice international sustainability best standards; encouraging high yield visitation by offering visitors an easy way of determining where genuine and authentic ecotourism experiences are found; joining an established global network of like-minded destinations ecotourism excellence striving for and demonstrating that their sustainable and ecotourism credentials have been verified by a third-party independent auditor.

Destinations currently engaged in the program include:

According to Tara Bennett, CEO of Tourism Port Douglas Daintree, the certification process was not only tailored to their specific environmental and economic constraints, but also helped them to identify and consolidate their initiatives in a holistic and structured manner:

"The process provided a valuable opportunity to identify and consolidate many of the government, not for profit, commercial actions and initiatives that were in place and bring them together in a structured way. The process importantly allowed us to identify future opportunities to pursue on our process of continuous improvement in sustainable tourism and living," she said.

Through the program's online platform, council staff who are working on the destination's application can access relevant documents and criteria easily. Topics covered throughout the criteria include destination management, nature and scenery, environment and climate, culture and tradition, social wellbeing and business and hospitality.

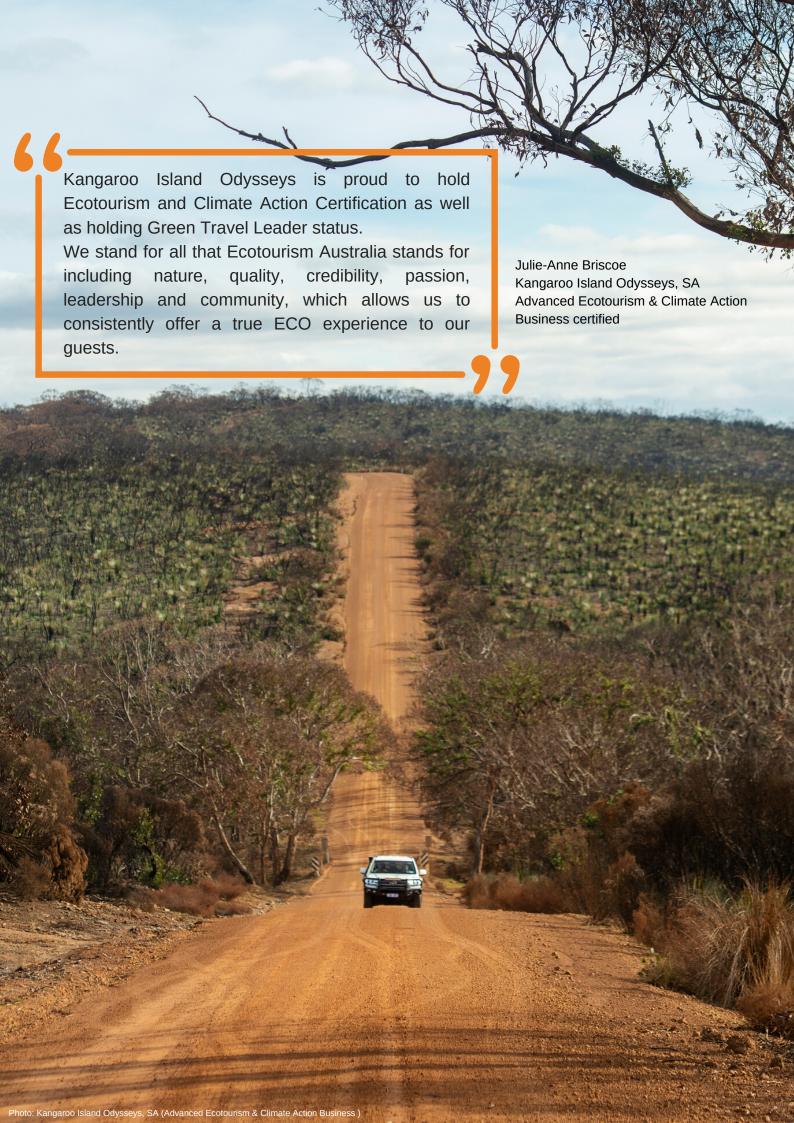
WWF-AUSTRALIA PARTNERSHIP

Following the 2019/20 bushfires, <u>Ecotourism Australia partnered with the World Wide Fund for Nature-Australia (WWF-Australia)</u>, with generous funding from the conservation charity assigned to help boost the recovery of Australia's nature-based tourism sector. As part of this new partnership, six bushfire-affected regions were added to the ECO Destination Certification program, including Quandamooka Country (QLD), East Gippsland Shire Council (VIC), Scenic Rim Regional Council (QLD) and Kangaroo Island Council (SA), with the last two still to be decided.

The ECO Destination Certification program combines EA's ecotourism criteria with the <u>Green Destinations Standard</u> for sustainable tourism, which are accredited by the Global Sustainable Tourism Council (GSTC). GLOBAL ECO CONFERENCE: THE LONGEST-RUNNING ECOTOURISM CONFERENCE IN THE WORLD

Once again, Ecotourism Australia (EA) hosted the Global Eco Conference in December 2019. This time, the 27th Global Eco Conference was held in Cairns, bringing together Australia's leading ecotourism experts to discuss the industry's main issues. Surrounded by two World Heritage Areas, The Great Barrier Reef and the Wet Tropics Rainforest, Port Douglas Daintree (QLD) was awarded the title of world's First ECO Certified Destination and the event was featured across multiple media platforms

Ecotourism Australia also held a networking event where members could catch up with other certified operators and the EA team, get an update from EA and the benefits of ECO certification, and meet some of our Global Eco attendees.

ECOTOURISM AUSTRALIA PARTNERS WITH WWF-AUSTRALIA

World Wide Fund for Nature-Australia (WWF-Australia) signed a <u>partnership</u> with Ecotourism Australia as a recovery package for the bushfire-affected tourism regions and businesses. This will help six new destinations to embark on the journey to become certified ECO Destinations. Funding from WWF-Australia also supports the development of a bushfire interpretation toolkit for ecotourism operators and a proposed bushfire recovery symposium. The forum will invite different stakeholders from bushfire-affected regions to share their learnings and is built on EA's existing Bushfire Recovery Position Statement,

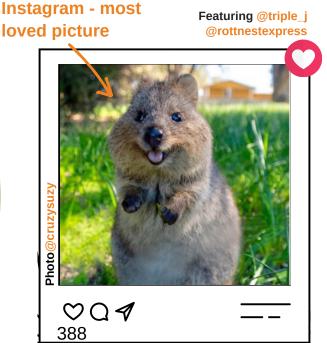
A TEAM OF PHD CANDIDATES APPOINTED TO RESEARCH PRESSING ISSUES FACING TOURISM

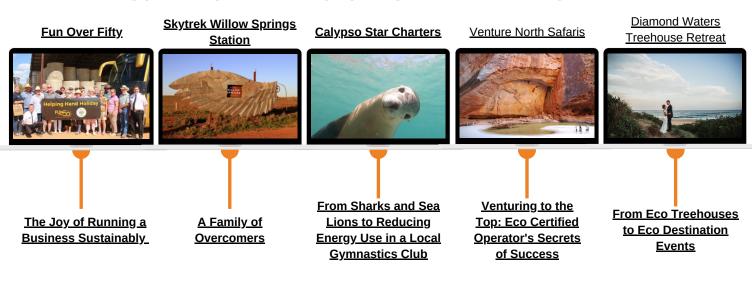

Orpheus Island is now 100% solar powered!

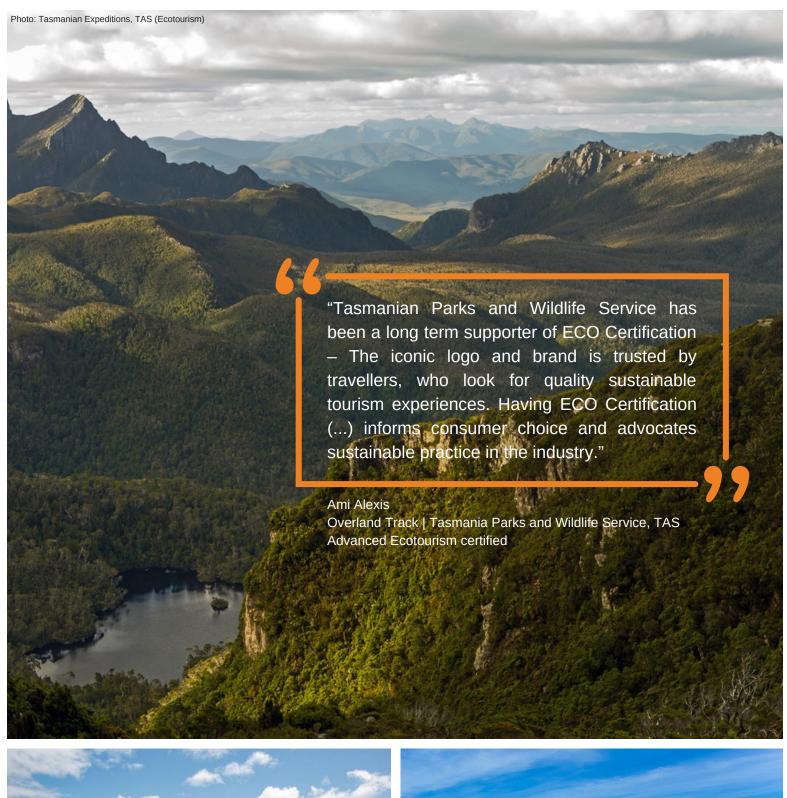

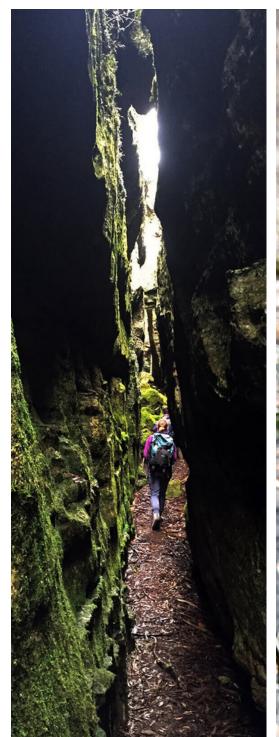

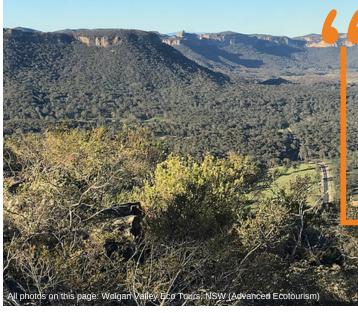
